


Con i Bambini is a nonprofit organisation created in June 2016 to carry out Italy's Fund Against Educational Poverty in Children and Youth. Since then, it has supported 809 projects nationwide, enabling 649,000 children and young people to overcome educational barriers and grow within inclusive, supportive learning communities. Its initiatives have also reached more than 204,800 parents and 93,400 teachers and educators, strengthening the networks that nurture children's learning and development across Italy.

Our work within the framework Global Career Readiness Initiative



"Crescere è un lavoro" is a three years national initiative launched in 2023 to support disadvantaged youth (14–19) in transitioning from school to work or higher education. It funds eight projects focused on improving orientation methods, self-knowledge, life and labor market skills with various approaches (orientation desks, project work and real-context learning experiences). In its first year, it directly benefited over 6,000 students and involved 200 educators in training and awareness sessions. The initiative includes a scientific committee, a community of practice to promote knowledge sharing and impact assessment. The baseline data collection included 1,537 student questionnaires, 134 teacher/professional questionnaires, and 10 focus groups with 78 educational community members, 107 students, and 111 professionals. The process was marked by strong collaboration and high engagement from the community.

Organization's related priorities

Enhancing career readiness and facilitating the transition to work or higher education, especially for minors living in vulnerable socio-economic contexts.

Priorities for community engagement

- Sharing practices on career readiness with other participants.
- Sharing practices on how to relate to public administration.
- Impact evaluation on the initiatives of the GCRI across countries

Current State of Career Readiness

- Historically, the Ministry of Education was focused mainly on vocational education. 2024 national framework for career readiness introduced key initiatives including: integration of career guidance into curricular modules, student E-Portfolios, appointment of tutor teachers for personalised support, enhanced teacher training and the Unified Digital Orientation Platform.

Challenges and Gaps

- Career education has historically been a low priority with marginal areas particularly affected by socio-economic poverty, limited educational access, and few training opportunities for minors.
- Teachers lack specialised career readiness training; families are often under-informed and not sufficiently involved in guiding students' choices.
- While the 2024 reforms were an important step forward, the full impact of the reforms remains to be seen.

Emerging Trends

- E-Portfolio**, a digital record of 30 hours of annual guidance activities, is a national initiative supporting students, teachers, and families to review progress and action plan together supporting personalised planning.
- Unified Digital Orientation Platform**, a central online resource and national platform offering information on education pathways and labour market trends, is guiding students to make informed choices.

Recommendations

- Equip educators with strong training; actively engage all stakeholders across the educational community, including families, schools, employers, and higher education institutions.
- Share successful practices from third-sector initiatives and multi-stakeholder partnerships.
- Empower students in their choices using accessible and holistic methods that combine individual and group activities.
