

Global Career Education Forum Brief

November 4th - 7th, 2024



Context

The Global Career Education Forum was a milestone for the <u>Global Career Education Network (GCEN)</u>, uniting members in person for the first time to strengthen connections and advance a shared mission of expanding equitable access to career readiness education.

Over four days, participants engaged in workshops and discussions on scaling impact through government engagement, leveraging metrics, and building strong employer partnerships. Localized insights, including government strategies and school-level implementation, offered practical examples to guide future efforts.

Key Insights From Sessions

Government Engagement to Scale Career Education

Building trust and forming strategic partnerships with governments are critical steps for scaling and sustaining career readiness initiatives. Collaborating with governments ensures alignment with national priorities, secures necessary funding, and embeds programs into broader educational systems, fostering long-term sustainability. • The Role of Metrics in Driving Social Impact

Robust measurement systems are a cornerstone of effective career education programs. By tracking progress and identifying areas for improvement, they enhance program delivery and inform strategic adjustments. Strong metrics provide compelling evidence of impact, which is essential for engaging key stakeholders and mobilizing support for scaling initiatives. More here.

Employer Engagement For Impact

Meaningful partnerships with employers offer students access to industry-relevant knowledge, hands-on learning opportunities, and exposure to diverse career pathways. By equipping students with the skills demanded by the job market, employer partnerships support transitions from education to employment. More here.

Implementing Career Education at the School Level

Beyond dedicated career education programs, integrating career readiness skills—such as collaboration, critical thinking, problem-solving, and teamwork—into the broader curriculum enriches students' academic experiences while building practical competencies. - January 22nd Session We'll kick off 2025 by creating a space to deepen our understanding of each other's work, celebrating successes and sharing priorities for the year ahead.
- Monthly Sessions (February-June) The topics, facilitators, and speakers for our upcoming sessions have been finalized, providing a robust lineup of learning opportunities.
- Developing an External Engagement Plan Work is underway to craft a strategy that highlights the
 network's value to key stakeholders, including targeted outreach efforts to promote the network's
 positioning and sustainability.
- World Youth Skills Day 2025 (July 15) A dedicated working group is being established to organize
 an online event celebrating World Youth Skills Day. This event will convene leading stakeholders in
 career education to foster collaboration and highlight key initiatives.
- **Case Studies** Finalize the terms of reference and launch case studies focused on student-centered activities and strengthening the career education ecosystem.
